With this issue of *Fanfare*, I am announcing a new Region 3 Digital Photo Contest. (This is based loosely on how Region 15 has run their contest.) I hope many of

you participate and wish you all luck!

Region 3 Digital Photo Contest Categories:

- 1. Images of Region 3 daylilies (may be single blooms, multiple blooms, or clumps registered by Region 3 hybridizers.) Companion plants, garden art, etc. may be included in the background, but the dominant image must be a daylily registered by a Region 3 hybridizer.
- 2. Images of Region 3 members, preferably candid shots of members engaged in daylily activities.
- 3. Landscapes featuring Region 3 gardens. A significant part of the landscape must include daylilies.
- 4. Artistic Shots. This may include close-ups of flowers, garden vignettes, insects, birds, etc. Photos featuring daylilies, a part of a daylily, or a daylily motif will have preference over images without any part of a daylily if the photos are otherwise equal in quality.
- 5. Daylilies from a Different Point of View features manipulated images created by combining elements from more than one image or by obvious changes in color, form, shape, or any combination thereof to create a unique final photo. All original images used/combined must have been taken by the final image creator. Daylilies or Region 3 members must be dominant in the final image, with preference given to Region 3-hybridized daylilies.
- 6. Youth Contest. This includes any submissions in all of the above categories from those under 21 years of age.

The deadline for the 2023 Region 3 Digital Photo Contest is August 1, 2023. To submit your entries, please post them to:


For each photo file you upload, please note in the file information which the category you are entering, your name and email, as well as including the details of the photo (flower name, location, etc.).

Come see the gardens of Tidewater, Virginia! The summer regional meeting will be on Saturday, June 24 and Sunday, June 25 with open gardens June 22-26. We are offering the option of numerous gardens for your viewing pleasure. Each is unique, all are worth your consideration to visit. This will be a self-conducted tour and car-pooling is strongly encouraged. Look on the ADS website under Get Involved/Events/Region 3 for more information and the registration form (on page 9 of this issue). Cost of registration is \$100.

Because of a venue change, our schedule has been adjusted. Saturday night's buffet dinner will be at Jennifer Reed's house at 2804 West Point Ct, Virginia Beach VA 23452. Breakfast and lunch on Sunday are on your own. The dinner and auction on Sunday night will be at the Delta Hotels by Marriott Chesapeake Norfolk on 725 Woodlake Drive, Chesapeake, VA 23320, 757-523-1500. A block of rooms has been reserved at the Delta Hotel by Marriott at \$199 per night. A Google interactive map of the gardens will be provided to those who register for the meeting. Many of the gardens will be open before or after the meeting.

Garden Judges Workshops Taught by Jim Murphy and Kris Bender

Studying for and qualifying as a garden judge is an opportunity to gain critical insight in the evaluation of daylily cultivars and provides a deeper appreciation of both new and older daylilies. Only garden judges can vote for the numerous AHS cultivar awards, thereby providing an essential service to AHS. Sign up on the registration form. The cost is \$5.00 for each class. The manual, Judging Daylilies--Garden by Scott Elliott, is required for either or both classes. Garden Judges 1 will be offered on Saturday afternoon, June 24, from 1:00 to 3:30pm (2.5 hours), location to be determined. Garden Judges 2 will be offered on Sunday morning, June 25, at Stacy Kucharczk Garden from 9:00 to 11:00am. Classes will be cancelled if registration numbers are insufficient. The reason for the separation of the two classes by a day is so that a person can take both and qualify as a garden judge in one weekend.

Clinic II would be offered if anyone wants it, but they must already be a student-in-training and pre-register by June 9. Clinics I and III are offered online in April and October or contact Kathleen Schloeder for other arrangements.

Featured Gardens

Pinkham Gardens, Linda and Bill Pinkham
 GPS address is 24389 Mouring Dr., Carrollton, VA
 23314; cell: 757-334-3999; June 22-26, 9 AM-4 PM
 This is a collector's garden, with the biggest collection



being approximately 1,000 named daylily cultivars on the 3+ acre property; plus, about 10,000 seedlings on a property next door. The owners, horticulturists Linda & Bill Pinkham, have rarely met a plant they didn't like. Bill is the designer and Linda is the "head weeder."

The front entrance to the house challenges you to walk across the Japanese inspired pond filled with Koi. This area is planted with tropical-looking hardy plants and truly tropical plants that vacation outdoors here from May to October. There are many Japanese maples on site, as well as hydrangeas, perennials, conifers, no-spray roses, vines, and succulents. One of the newer gardens is a crevice garden of unusual miniatures.

There will be potted daylilies for sale on-site, but anyone interested in buying should visit Linda Pinkham at www.plantstep.com under Catalogs. An order should be emailed to her at least a week before the Regional. Within the website, click on catalogs at the top and scroll to Linda Pinkham.



• Marga Cahoon Garden GPS address: 1572 Adams Drive West, Suffolk, VA 23436; cell: 757-644-5476; June 23-25, 9 AM-3PM The grounds are surrounded on three sides by a lake and feature several gardens: perennial, butterfly, Japanese, hydrangea, conifer and shade. Daylilies are massed with other perennials and have been chosen to provide bloom from May through October.



• Anne Urbi Garden

The Urbis removed every blade of grass and planted a perennial garden in their front yard under the guise of floodproofing. The garden's creation became the perfect outdoor design and construction project for a pandemic. The neighbors watched as truckloads of soil became rolling beds on higher ground where currently around 400 labeled daylily cultivars are woven amongst lots of unusual perennials and bulbs. Conifers, Japanese maples, and flowering shrubs with colorful foliage provide year-round interest, while updated walkways literally take the property to a new level. The garden is centrally located on the tour so come by anytime!

• Stacy Kucharczk Garden

Site of Garden Judges 2 workshop on Sunday, June 25, 9:00 AM to 11:00 AM (2-2.25 hours) Over the last 14 years, several theme gardens have been created around their circa 1922 1.5-story bungalow. The daylily beds started small in 2014 and have expanded to include more than 500 named cultivars and includes a path made from elephant ear stepping stones that Dan and Stacy crafted. Four years ago, Stacy dabbed her first pollen and the seedling beds followed in 2020. This garden has been awarded the City of Chesapeake "Notable Yard" for the Hickory District in 2022, is a certified Wildlife Habitat, and is on the Pollinator Pathway. Dan and Stacy look forward



to welcoming you to their garden; pick up a lunch to go from one of the nearby restaurants and come sit in one of the many outdoor seating areas and enjoy the blooms.

• Jen Reed Garden

Meticulously labeled daylilies grow amongst the cannas, iris, and hibiscus. The gardens are submerged 1-2 times a year when a storm pushes the brackish water over the 470 feet of bulkhead, so each plant along the wall is chosen for its salt tolerance. It is a wonderful relaxing haven.





Sterrett Gardens, Rich and Rikki Sterrett

Located on Virginia's Eastern Shore, this AHS display garden includes approximately two acres of mixed perennial borders planted in the English cottage garden style. Nearly one acre of daylilies is lined out for sales. Numerous Region 3 and nationally recognized hybridizers are represented in this collection of more than 1700 cultivars. The garden was started 1983. Both historical mainstays and newest introductions can be found in the gardens. Both Rich and Rikki are longtime garden judges. We suggest that attendees stop on the way to or from the Convention. There is a toll on the 19-mile Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel, and they accept E-Z Pass.

This urban quasi-naturalist's daylily beds were a deliberate choice to decrease the front lawn two years ago. These beds are also home to other native plants for pollinators. Minimal feeding, no pesticides, and several other natural ways are employed to manage everything in this urban yard. The "leftovers" bed between the sidewalk and the street are unlabeled. Squirrels and other varmints remove the labels when they feel like pranking humans. (I think the crows are in on it, too.)

At the January and March club meetings, NVDS members learned more about miniature daylilies through two presentations. In January, Melodye Campbell, the ADS historian and archivist, gave a Zoom program the focused on the history of miniature daylilies and their hybridizers. In March, Janice Kennedy followed up with a presentation on the miniature daylilies in the collection at Meadowlark Botanical Gardens. Although miniature daylilies are about 2% of all registrations at the national level, miniatures represent 8% of their collection.

If you are interested in seeing miniature daylilies, Meadowlark's collection has all of the Stout and Lenington award winning miniatures, and one-third of all the Donn Fischer Memorial winners. 

Make Mine Miniatures! Part Two

I first discovered and fell in love with the miniatures of Jim and Mary Netherton when visiting Region 5 (Georgia) on the 2015 National Tour, and subsequently in 2018, when speaking at the Region 5 summer meeting. Sadly, after Jim Netherton passed away in 2020, their Peace On Earth Gardens in Western Georgia closed, making their daylilies difficult to locate. If you have the opportunity to obtain any of their little ones, I urge you to take a chance on them. Jim's 'Tribute to the Mayor' (16), a dormant 26" yellow with violet eye and 2.87" blooms, gives you a hint of its parentage, and 'We Love Promise' (18) is a dormant 26" yellow and orange bi-tone with a red eye and 2.75" blooms, is a favorite here. Mary was first in their family to hybridize miniatures, and her 'Wayne and Coral's Love (13) is a classic, award-winning miniature. It boasts 22" scapes and 2.5" blooms of orange with darker veining and eye. 'Rhett My Boy' (15) named after a grandchild, has 24" scapes with 2.75" of crimson with lighter sepals. It produces huge proliferations, which I've rooted for several friends. My plant of 'Rhett My Boy' came from daylily friend Janice Kennedy, who sent several huge proliferations a few years ago which amazingly grew into a full sized plant and bloomed the very next year. My favorite of Mary Netherton's minis is 'Tim's Poetry' (13), a 26" dormant with 2.5" blooms registered as "a frosted orange

salmon with dark eye." The color is indeed elusive, but totally enchanting. As I write this today, October 12, two rebloom scapes are still valiantly trying to bloom even after an earlier frost this week.

It's always fun to "rediscover" some of the older miniatures that were hybridized long before this daylily form had caught the attention of mainstream daylily growers. 'Little Peanut' (E. Winniford 85) a SEV with 18" scapes and 2.5" light maroon with a yellow edge and darker eye is perfectly hardy here, as is 'Little Brown Boy' (Winniford 82), a miniature with dwarf foliage, 14" scapes and 2.5" blooms, a brown and tan bi-tone. Both have delightful tiny blooms, and any visitors who see them want them.

It wouldn't be fair to omit Elizabeth Salter, who is the most prolific hybridizer of miniature daylilies, with 98 registered



as E.H. Salter and 58 registered under her maiden name, Hudson. Currently, only one Liz Salter miniature, 'Border Dragon' grows here but is too new to evaluate. Several of her miniatures which grew here and thrived during the past 25 years were 'Jason Salter' (87); 'Mary Ethel Anderson' (95); 'Patchwork Puzzle' (90); and 'Dark Avenger' (88).

Steve Williams from Columbus, OH, has hybridized several fine small and miniature blooms. His 'Little Tutu' (17) is a dormant mini double, which always blooms double here. 2.5" blooms are lavender rose, with darker halo and veins on 25" scapes. Steve's 'Too Cute' (12) is a 32" mini with 2.37" rose and cream bicolor blooms, winning the Donn Fischer Medal for best miniature in 2021.

Dominique and Scott Elliott from GA have hybridized a number of miniatures. Dom's 'Wise Blood' (15) is a fine plant here. Blooms are tall, red with green throat 35" tall scape with 2.87" well-branched floriferous scapes. Scott's 'Tiddles' (21), is a 30" yellow with a 2.75" red patterned eye and 'Boogie Woogie Bob' (21) boasts a 21" scape and 2.99" double blooms of light melon. It is registered at 99% double, and always blooms double here.

Robin Calderon registered a unique miniature, 'Mookiate' in 2016. It is dormant, blooms extra early, and the 2" bloom looks ever so tiny. It's a bi-tone, brick red petals with yellow sepals. Look for this one, it's well worth growing and unique.

Fred Manning from Lillian, Alabama, is hybridizing some excellent miniature and small daylilies. Some which are particularly happy here are 'Lillian's Violet Eyed Pixie' (19), a SEV 2.75" cream with a multi violet eye on 21" scapes and 'Lillian's Pretty and Prissy' (21) a SEV 24" cream with ruffled petals and a multi-colored eye. A lesser-known but worthy of mention mini is 'Buddy's Angel Baby' (J. Hall 06), a 2.75" purple diploid with a dark purple eye on a 26" scape.

Finally, I'll mention one that you may already be familiar with, a must have for anyone who wants to start a collection of miniatures. I first saw Kenny Begnaud's 'Lil' Black Buds' when he showed it to me in his Baton Rouge garden many years ago. For years, I hesitated to get it, because how would a Louisiana-bred daylily perform in a Virginia garden? But I kept seeing it grow well in gardens all over the country and finally acquired it just this year. These 2.5" blooms grown on well-branched 22" scapes; do indeed boast a multitude of little black buds. Additionally, 'Lil' Black Buds' is a multi- award winner. You should try it!

Some recent acquisitions I'm particularly anxious to see bloom next season are 'Just Jeanne' (T. Herrington 21), 'Munchkin Parade' (T. Herrington 21), and 'URAQT' (S. Elliott 21), and finally, 'Memories of Maude' (J. Kennedy 23) by Region 3 hybridizer, Janice Kennedy.

It covers several acres on a hilltop in North Garden, VA (south of Charlottesville, VA) surrounded by deer fencing. The AHS display garden features many registered introductions by Jim and Margo, by other Region 3 hybridizers, and by many hybridizers from other regions.


Both diploids and tetraploids will be on display, including Jim's collection of polymerous cultivars and a few doubles and small flowers. Photographs

Electronic submission of photos is required (jpeg). Hard copy prints and slides will not be accepted. All photo submissions must be accompanied by a description, the photographer's name and photographer's contact information. Either written verification that a signed consent form is on file at the national level or a signed copy of the Photography Copyright Consent Form (Page 73 of the Regional Officers Handbook--http://www.daylilynetwork.org/?AHS_Policies) is required.

IMPORTANT: Obtaining photographic release forms (for images of subjects under the age of 18) and providing copies when requested is the photographer's responsibility. Parental permission to publish the photograph must be obtained in writing before the picture is submitted to *Fanfare*.
